

Chamber's waitress of the year is picked

Farmington's first "waitress of the year" contest picked Mrs. Dorothy Warner, Mrs. Debra Sullivan and Mrs. Joan Glowacki as the best in their field.

The contest, sponsored by the Farmington Chamber of Commerce, held the finals in the Holiday Inn Monday.

Mrs. Warner was named first in the category for restaurants serving liquor. She works at the Roman Terrace restaurant.

Miss Sullivan and Mrs. White shared honors in the category for restaurants not serving liquor. Miss Sullivan works for the House of Huie, and Mrs. Glowacki works for Blakeney's.

THE CONTEST, which has been running for the past month, selected from among the waitresses named "best" by the customers at their restaurants.

There were 16 final contestants in the runoff.

Judges in the contest included mayors Robert McConnell and Ralph Yoder, Chuck Thurston, food writer from the Detroit Free Press, Dan McCosh, editor of the Farmington Observer & Eccentric, and television newsman Kelly Burke.

The chamber hopes to make the contest an annual event, to recognize the service provided by the waitresses in the community, and to promote the local restaurants.

Lakeway paving

The Farmington City Council took no action on paving Lakeway Street after residents protested the anticipated cost at a public hearing Monday.

Despite complaints of standing water on the street, the residents were unwilling to pay for the paving on a local assessment basis.

The council, concerned with the problem, called a special meeting two weeks ago on Lakeway, then followed with the public hearing before taking no action on the paving.

Another unpaved street, Prospect north of Shiawassee, will have a hearing at the next council meeting, April 1.

In other business, the council:

- Awarded a contract to McCarthy Contracting Co., for \$78,000, for the paving of Power Rd. from Grand River to Nine Mile.
- Agreed to take bids prior to next year's budget on six new police cars.
- Adopted a resolution urging the state legislature to allow \$2,000 in deductions from the state income tax for volunteer work.
- Proclaimed April 6 Smile Day at Farmington High.
- Proclaimed March 17-24 International DeMolay Week.
- Adopted an ordinance introduced last meeting restricting the operation of "coin-operated

amusement devices" to persons to persons 16 or older.

- Adopted a resolution of intent to sell \$15,000 in bonds for the paving of Hawthorne St.

Charles Portus is ruled insane

Charles Portus, 18, was found innocent by reason of insanity last week in Oakland County Circuit Court.

Portus was charged with the July 21, 1973 killing of seven-year-old Keith Menelli, of Farmington Hills.

The decision was handed down by Judge Farrell E. Roberts March

11 following more than two weeks of testimony.

Farrell ruled that Portus be remanded to the custody of the state mental health division for an indefinite period of time.

Portus allegedly sexually abused the boy and then took him to a wooded area and strangled him with a shoelace, police said.

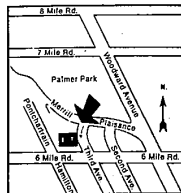

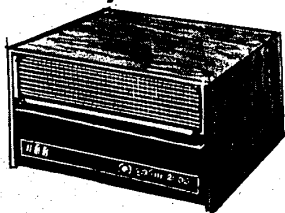
