ROBERTS AND others like him are responsible for raising enough money to reach the 1974 Oakland County quota, a quota which, according to Roberts, has been increased by 20 per cent over that of last year. It is \$257.000 to the United Fund Drive, the cancer fund raising attempt is not a once-year drive. Fund-raising activities will continue throughout the year in an attempt to reach the quota. HE SAID this encourages cancer victims when they need it most and helps them realize that others have been able to recover from the disease and go on to lead normal, full lives.

You might be interested in knowing that as a professional, these individuals are often tops but suffer the mounting tension of the individual problems of their pa-tient load as well as a low frustra-tion tolerance in their need for achievement and recognition.

A CLUE TO a professionals' impending disaster is often the use of drugs and alcohol. Additionally, those around him will see that he is becoming increasingly indecisive, disorganized and depressed. His life becomes harried and he ceases to separate his personal and professional life.

Often he will begin to neglect his practice. Probably the biggest difficulty among professionals is admitting to themselves and others that they need help.

A professional's educational background does not immunize him against his own emotional conflicts. All of us dealing with serious problems of others, medical or psychological, must keep some professional distance in order to survive.

in combination with an office prac-tice, which is satisfying and varied is critical. Living one's practice seven days a week is a form of psy-chological suicide which may lead to physical suicide. Unfortunately, a number of these individuals are those who care the most and who carry home their patients' problems and live with them long after the office door is closed.
