## Community Center starts spring term

Trout fishermen can ready themselves for opening day at a course being taught at Farmington Community Center. Dale Crawford will teach tying techniques and rod construction at 10 sessions beginning Monday, April 1, at 8 p.m.

Instruction will cover methods of stream angling, trout-related entomology, and fishing for lake-run steelhead and salmon. The experienced angler can benefit as can the novice.

Would-be flyers can enroll in a private pilot ground school course. Ten sessions taught by veteran flight instructors Woody Coche and Gene Fincham will equip them to pass the F.A.A. written examination.

This class is new at the Center and covers airplane systems, airport communication, meteorology, air regulations, charts, radio navigation and all other required subjects.
