Alcoholism has been called the most serious drug problem, in terms of

number of victims and cost to society, physical damage to the body and its organs, and the large number of fatalities resulting from withdrawal symptoms.

Along with cancer, mental illness, and heart disease alcoholism ranks among the major national health threats. Yet the U.S. Department of Health. Education and Welfare has termed alcoholism this country's most neglected disease.

ALCOHOLISM is a complex, pro-

ALCOHOLISM is a complex, pro-gressive illness.
Alcoholics are sick, just as people suffering from heart disease or can-cer are sick. If not treated, alcohol-ism ends in permanent mental dam-age, physical incapacity or early death.

Some 6.5 million employed workers are alcoholics. Loss of productivity because of alcoholism has been computed at 10 billion dollars annually.

FIFTY per cent of all fatal accidents occurring on the roads today in-volve alcohol. Fifty per cent of these

involve an alcoholic.
Forty per cent of all male admissions to state mental hospitals suffer from alcoholism.
Thirty-one per cent of suicides are

ALCOHOLISM is treatable. Effective programs show recovery rates of 65 to 70 per cent.

Education, early detection and community treatment are the greatest forces operating today for the control and reduction of alcoholism.

MS. NIEMEYER'S suggestions for financial planning are not restricted as guidelines for working women only. They can be turned into a solid financial base for anyone working, she said. According to Ms. Niemeyer, social security benefits provide one of the mainstays of future financials.

As a savings guideline, the president of the Detroit Chapter of the Chartered Life Underwriters suggested accumulating the equivalent of six months earnings.

Noting that most single women
do not believe they need a life insurance policy, Ms. Niemeyer recommended a \$5,000 life insurance
policy. The insurance, she commented, may be necessary to cover
taxes and death-related expenses.


The show called "Fantasy and Reality" will display Miss Robinson's paintings inspired by a three week Safari to Africa.
