Nixon overseas policy praised by Ford

Vice President Gerald R. Ford made little effort at hiding his partisanship Tuesday and Wednesday as he hoisted the Republican banner for some old-fashioned political stumping in the area.

Speaking on behalf of two Republican Congressmen (Robert J. Huber and William S. Broomfield, of the 18th and 19th districts), the Vice President seized every opportunity to put in a good word for his party and for his President.

Again and again—be it at a closed reception, during a dinner speech or throughout a press conference—Ford pointed out why he felt the Democrats are wrong and the Republicans are right on certain issues, most notably national defense and cross-district busing.

And always underlying his remarks was his continued support for President Richard Nixon.

"Let me assure you that the President is in the best of health mentally and physically," he said to his Republican audience. "He is determined to continue the mandate for which he was elected in 1972.

Dems don't want appointed exec

A petition campaign to win an elected executive for Oakland County was launched at last week's meeting of the Farmington Democratic Club.

The county-wide campaign seeks some 14,000 signatures to allow voters at the August primary to decide whether Oakland County will elect or appoint its chief executive officer.

At its April 4, meeting the Oak-land County Board of Commis-sioners opted for an appointive administrator who would be re-sponsible to a majority of the board, Democratic Club chairman Aldo Vagnozzi reported to the meeting.

"We were frankly disappointed that the commissioners chose to deny the voters the right to make this decision," Vagnozzi said.

"At a time when we see daily the shortcomings of placing tremendous power in the hands of anonymous, appointed officials far removed from the voters, the action of the commissioners is not in the best interests of Oakland County taxpayers.

"An elected chief executive can be held responsible for success or failure by having to periodically face the voters. An appointed administrator could remain in office as long as 14 members of the board agree, or could be removed from office by the same 14 people despite a good record of achievement."

Vagnozzi appointed J. Andrew Ditzhazy of Tralee Trail as Farm-ington coordinator of the petition campaign. Several petitions were signed at the meeting.
