The above bridges to have balustrade of 8 in to hold the gravel and two gas pipe rails with four posts to be used on each side of the bridges. The wings to be two ft. at the base and battered to one ft. at the top and deep enough to be below the frost and solid ground

The above bridges are to be refoot apart lengthwise and cross-wise. Wings to the above bridges are to be tied to the abutments with corrogated bars every foot in height. Concrete used in the bridges to be composed of the best Portland cement and good clean sharp gravel in the proportion of 4 to 1; no stones to be used in the Bridges are to be guaran teed to carry 15 tons in weight
