Smooth crown and bangs: fit for hat

Waves back, too 30s red heads in vogue again

The spirit of the 1930s has reached down to hair roots this spring, coloring them red and twisting cinnamon tendrils into open-wave curls.

Fashionable hair doesn't exceed collar length and is frequently shorter, said New York stylist Michel Kazan, while at Bonwit Teller in Troy last week.

Those short wisps of hair are color hybrids of the 30s henna-red head and are lightly shaded auburn, copper or fire-blond.

American women are not adopting red-shaded curls as readily as Europeans, Kazan said, while cautioning that an overdose of ratones can cause the complexion to look yellow.

WHETHER RED, blonde or brunette, Kazan's styles are sculpted into curls which encircle the head and frequently bow down to the forehead. Kazan's quill bangs cling closely to the forehead and brush into an upswing feathery fan.

The updated 30s styles are derived from a past era but they are not mirror images, Kazan said. "We have to adopt to modern life," he commented.

The feminine styles are designed to accessorize the easily constructed but dressed look of current fashions.

They are also cut to be worn

beneath hats, with tendrils curling from beneath brims, plumes and feathers. Sit a hat atop improperly styled hair and the effect is lost, Kazan said.

The New York stylist, whose hands cut the first bouffant, said he did not feel upstaged by the millinery-mania which currently steeps the fashion industry.

HIS STYLES are necessary to complete the hatted look, he said, adding that hats are a fashion fixture frequently removed.

"Most of her life a woman is without a hat," he said. "She might wear a hat one or two hours but most of the time she's in evening clothes without a hat, at home without a hat or dining with her husband without a hat."

Kazan, who works closely with New York fashion designer James Galanos, presents two collections every year based on spring and fall fashions.

One of the drawbacks of his profession, he said, is the lack of "fabrics" native to fashion designing.

"I have much less material to work with even though we have women with beautiful faces and beautiful hair," he said. "Still, it's a small little head."
