FARMINGTON HILLS - A report on the recent embezzlement within the Farmington Hills Police Department is expected to be given at the council meeting Monday April 22.
According to city clerk Floyd Cairns, the report will be given by the Appeals Board and the Police Committee.

The report is expected to deal with the reinstatement of police Lt. Wil-liam Kelly.

Kelly was suspended by Public Safety Director Ronald Holko because of certain actions taken during the investigation. A police appeals board reinstated him April 16.
