FitzPatrick to seek congressional seat

Robert E. FitzPatrick, chairman of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, announced his candidacy for the congressional seat in the 17th District, saying he wants to "help put America back on the right track again."

FitzPatrick, a Detroit Democrat, is seeking the seat now held by U.S. Rep. Martha Griffiths (D - Detroit) who is retiring. The district includes Redford Township, Farmington, Farmington Hills, Southfield, Lathrup Village and northwest Detroit.

"I want to help make sure that the Watergate of the present results in the opening of a floodgate of new honesty, new integrity and new people in themselves, their government and the nation," FitzPatrick said.

FitzPatrick, 40, is serving his third term on the county board. He is co-chairman of the Detroit Wayne County Criminal Justice System Coordinating Council, chairman of the Wayne County Manpower Planning Board, first vice president of the Michigan Association of Counties and a member of the board of directors of the National Association of Counties.

FitzPatrick attended Alma College and Florida State University and is co-owner of Suburban Medical Clinic in Livonia. He is a Korean War veteran and former football coach at Mackenzie High School and St. Peter & Paul.

In making his announcement, FitzPatrick said he was worried "about the virus of distrust that has spread throughout the land."

"More and more I hear people saying, 'there isn't anyone you can trust anymore. The gyp, the fast-shuffler, the empty promise, all seem to so many as the rule in Washington instead of the exception,'" he said.

FitzPatrick said the problems facing the nation include: "Street after street of boarded up homes, the grand menancing footcrops behind you, the incredible and constant rise in prices, the struggle to find a job, the worry of whether drugs will penetrate your own family, the loopholes that let a president pay less in taxes than you, the difficulty of the elderly to live in dignity, the tough job of putting your kids through college, the shortages of this and the shortages of that, and every day and everywhere we all seem to have less in our pocket to do the things that we need to get done."
