
Warriors stop CC, make it four straight

In its stiffest test to date, the Warriors overcame a fired-up De-troit Catholic Central team before 8,000 fans in the Boys Bowl Sun-day 16-6 to up its season record to

4-0. Catholic Central, formerly ranked second in the state, saw its league record fall to 0-2.

"THAT PUTS them out of the race unless something really freaky happens," said Brother Rice coach Al Fracessa.
"But it's still a race for us, we have to beat Notre Dame, which beat Catholic Central 34-6 last week and we have to play De La Salle which only took 10-6 to Notre Dame."

Brother Rice dominated the game from the start, going 75 yards in five plays the first time it handled the ball.
Senior halfback Mike Cullen sprinted the last 35 yards for the score and K.C. Ryan booted the ex-tra point to give the Warriors a lead which they would never relin-ouish.

IT LOOKED as if Brother Rice might run away with things as John Detloff recovered a Sham-rock fumble on the ensuing kickoff and the Warriors took over on the CC 27 yard line.

At the seven minute mark of the second quarter, Catholic Central got right back in the game when Rice quarterback Don Henricks fumbled on a keeper play at the Rice five yard line.

Central quarterback Pete Cline promptly lost five yards and two downs trying to pass, but with third and goal from the nine, Cline gave the Shamrocks its only points of the day when he hit Pat Ryan in the endzone to pull Central to within a point.
