## Milliken defends bond issue

Gov. William G. Milliken stoutly de-Gov. William G. Milliken stoutly de-fended his proposed \$\frac{y}{y}\$ billion trans-portation bond issue as a benefit to people and predicted he would do bet-ter among new voters, than an early poll indicated.

The governor was in Livonia Mon-day at a fund-raising reception for State Rep. Robert Grake and then ended a long campaigni day in South-field speaking to the Detroit Police Officers Association.

Milliken, a Republican, was asked to respond to Human Rights Party candidate Zolton Frenchy's contention that the airport and lags port portions: Jof the transportation bond issue helped "corporations" And did nothing for "ordinary people"

"TO ME THE WHOLE meaning and purpose of this bond issue is for people." said Milliken, a six-year veteran of the governor's office who is seeking a new four-year term.

"This will provide jobs. It will bring higher economic standards. It will help develop inter-citig and intra-city us systems. It will improve the movement of goods."

The bond issue is If possal D on the Nov. 5 ballot. About 'all' the money would be pegged to southeastern Michigan's bus and r.juld transit system. Milliken pointed out that only \$150 million (13.7 per cent) would go into airports and lake ports. Milliken denied Ferency's whare that paying off the bonds from the general fund would require either an increase in taxes or cuts in other services. The governor said that as the earlier "clean water," bond issue is paid off, the revenues supporting it could be applied to U\* transportation bonds.

THE GOVERNOR called for a vote against Proposal A, aimed at freezing the proportion of the state gasoline tax that could aid the operations of bus and rapid transit systems. "Emphatically I have said I don't propose to levy any more beyond what we have." he said Michigan taxes gasoline at nine cents a gallon. taxes gasoline at nine cents a gallon. with a half-cent going to public transportation programs. "But it's a bad legal principle to freeze the allocation. It's a bad constitutional law. What may be applicable and pertinent loday might be bad 20 years from now." he added.

A DISAPPOINTMENT to Milliken was the portion of a Market Opinion Research poll for The Detroit News which showed Democrat Sander Levin leading Milliken 79 to 21 per cent among the 18-20 year age group. "I have asked the Legislature for further measures which would give Michigan the tools to wage the most comprehensive anti-crime campaign in the state's history, including mandatory additional prison sentences for persons convicted of committing crimes with handguns.

"Last year, the increase in crime nationally was nearly three times as great as it was in Michigan.
"We hear alo these days about the rights of defendants, and those rights of the people are important too..a right to walk the streets at any hour without being accosted by drug pushers or losing their lunch money to extortion-state..a right to do business without constant harassment by members of the mob."
