## Chargers blanked again Jays drift to victory

At first glance, Southfield's 5-2 triumph over Berkley last Monday looked pretty good. But Blue Jay baseball coach Greg Sliwka wasn't in a mood to celebrate after the game.

"I wasn't especially pleased with their performance today (Monday), said Sliwka, in his first year as varsity baseball coach. "I thought they lacked the enthusiasm. They didn't have the proper winning attitude."

"They just kind of went out there and played. It got them by once, but I don't think it'll get them by too often."

Winning pitcher Rocky Davis evened his record at 2-2. He gave up five hits, fanned eight and walked three (two coming in the last inning when Berkley scored one).

Southfield scored three runs in the third. Don Fisher led off with

a triple and scored on Chris Mytnik's single. Berkley then committed two errors, allowing Mytnik to score. John Cohen came home on another error.

The Jays picked up another run in the fifth when Mytnik singled, moved to second on a passed ball, took third on a balk by pitcher John Conrad, and scored on another error — Berkley's fifth of the afternoon.

Berkley's Dan Baran worked five innings in taking the loss. The Bears scored a run in the sixth when Jay Lantz singled and scored. Bruce Flower's double. Davis walked the first two batters in the seventh. Then third baseman Robin Richards made an error which allowed Berkley's second run.

Southfield plays at Ferndale on May 3. Then the Jays must make up a rained-out game against Berkley on May 4. That game will

begin at 11 a.m. on Southfield's field.

**Lahser-Lathrup**  
Frustration is the name of the game for coach Don Shonta and his Southfield-Lathrup baseball team.

Bloomfield Hills Lahser edged Lathrup, 1-0, as Knight right-hander Mike Delvin tossed a three hitter. Delvin pitched five innings, struck out seven and walked two.

Lathrup's Ron Silberstein went the distance in taking his first loss of the season. He struck out five, passed two and gave up nine hits, including three infield singles.

The Chargers have suffered two straight shutouts and the lack of timely hitting is becoming a problem.

"We just don't seem to be getting any timely hits," Shonta said. "We're hitting the ball real well, but they're just not falling in."

## More coho coming in DNR planting

This spring's Great Lakes trout and salmon stocking program will show a substantial increase in the number of coho planted, continued emphasis on the sport fishery in the Detroit metropolitan area, and more lake trout plantings on offshore reefs.

Within the next several weeks, Department of Natural Resources (DNR) crews will place 11.5 million young hatchery-reared trout and salmon in Great Lakes streams and certain offshore waters.

Most of these fish—6.4 million—will go to the Lake Michigan area. Of the remainder, Lake Huron will get 2.5 million; Lake Superior, 1.8 million and Lake Erie, 760,000.

NEARLY 3.3 million coho,

more than a one-third increase over the number planted in 1973, will be stocked in Michigan waters this spring. About 2.7 million will be stocked in Lake Superior, with Lakes Superior, Huron and Erie getting the rest.

The largest planting at a single location will be made in the Platte River, and will consist of 800,000 coho from the Department's new Platte River Hatchery.

Chinook planting totals are about the same as last year, when some 3.8 million were stocked. Catching chinook in open water is not easy, but sport fishermen are getting better at it. The DNR—by continuing the planting of chinook—is assuring that the fish are there for the fishermen.
