

HRP schedules convention

The Human Rights Party (HRP) of Michigan has scheduled its state convention for Saturday and Sunday, May 25, 26, in East Lansing.

Preceding the state convention, all HRP county conventions will be held Saturday, May 18. This past weekend, May 4-5, the HRP held a statewide meeting to work on its 1974 platform and prepare for the '74 campaign.

The state convention will be held in the Unitarian Universalist Church, 855

Grove, one block east of Abbott, in East Lansing. The Saturday session will begin at 10 a.m. and Sunday's meeting will convene at 1 p.m.

Under HRP rules, all candidates who will be running for offices in the November general election, and whose district is entirely within the boundaries of a given county, will be nominated at the May 18 county conventions.

Lawyers will gather for annual institute

Some of the nation's leading trial lawyers will demonstrate their techniques and discuss legal issues at a two day institute, May 10 - 11 at the University of Michigan.

The theme of the 25th annual Advocacy Institute is: "Advocacy in the No-Fault Era."

The sponsor of the session to be held in Hill Auditorium on campus, is the Institute of Continuing Legal Education (ICLE), a joint unit of the University of Michigan and Wayne State University law schools and the state bar of Michigan.

Besides demonstrations with comparative cross-examination, the program will include lecture sessions on both days.

The Friday sessions beginning at 1:30 p.m. will include:

"Behavioral Therapy," James V. McConnell, professor of psychology, University of Michigan; "The Changing Emphasis in Class Actions," John C. Elam, Columbus, Ohio; "The Computer as an Aid to the Management of Litigation," Alexis M. Hawkins, Des Moines, Iowa; "The Trial as Theater," Jacob D. Fuchsberg, New York City.

The Saturday sessions which begin at 9 a.m. are:

"The Trial Bar and the Chief Justice," E. Donald Shapiro, dean and trustee of the New York Law School; "The Trial Lawyer's New Techniques," Judge Charles W. Jones of the U.S. District Court in Detroit; "The Electronic Courtroom," Gordon D. Schaber, dean of the McGeorge School of Law, University of the Pacific; "The Psychological Effect of No-Fault on Jurors," Craig Schenker, Cleveland, Ohio.
