suit with eight playing tricks. It is forcing for one round.

THE HAND in the diagram helped Helen Bernardini and

Eleanor Haack of Birmingham reach the best contract. Helen has just achieved her Life Master status and this deal helped her lead the field at a local game.

The bidding and play was quite simple as shown. Most partnerships reached six hearts, but the "system" helped this partnership reach six notrump. Once South opened and showed three aces and one king in the Gerber sequence, North could count 11 tricks.

There had to be another value and the small slam was obvious. Helen won the spade lead in her hand and later finessed the spade and made all 13 tricks.

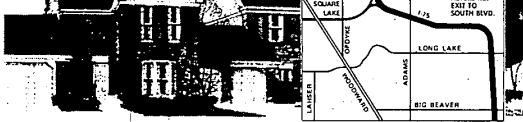

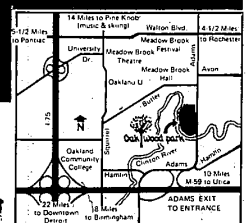

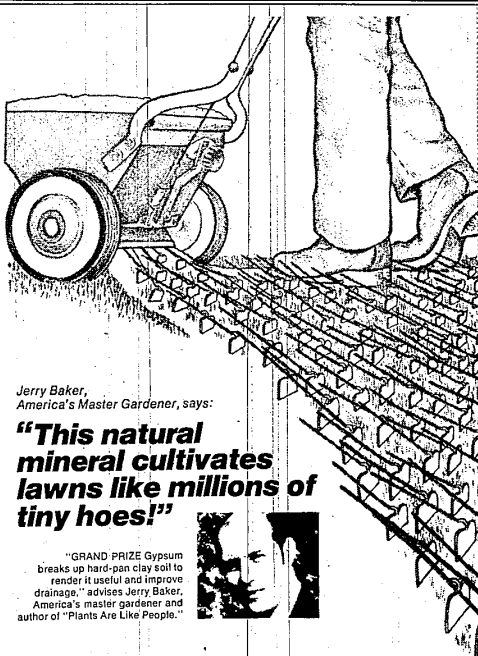
