800 cyclists pedal to heart's content

More than 800 cyclists turned out in support of the Michigan Heart Association's cyclethon Sunday, (May 5) on the Oakland University campus.

Perched on everything from unicycles to high wheelers, the cyclists were forced to dismount when afternoon rains dampened the three mile course.

Robert Flannery, association director of development, termed Sunday's ride at O.U. and one like it in Dearborn, "As one of our biggest special events. Between the two of them, we raised \$35,000-\$40,000."

The riders, still recovering from sore bottoms, tired arms and weary legs, have more work ahead. They must start collecting the money pledged for each mile they rode. One rider earned \$1,400 for the association.
