

Football camps ok'd by board of education

See the coach at your high school soon if you're thinking of trying out for varsity football next fall.

The Farmington Board of Education Tuesday approved a week of football camp for any person planning to try out for the varsity team.

The board will pay transportation costs of approximately \$310, provided there is fuel available to send the bus.

Expenses will be paid by each person attending.

Camp will run from Aug. 19-24.

The board approved the request after ascertaining that the same kind of enrichment was available for band members.

This is the first year Farmington has sent athletes to football camp and, "it is to be considered by the board as a kind of pilot program," suggested William Cortiss, school board treasurer.

Other business included approval of the rental of 5,000 square feet of "dead" storage space at \$1.25 a square foot with a short term, termination clause of 30 to 60 days.

William Prisk, school business manager explained, "This is an unusual request, but we have a great amount of heavy equipment."

He pointed to the voting booths stored at the edge of the auditorium of the Woodcreek School where the board was meeting.

"I hope we will secure our own space shortly, but in the meantime we have no place for these and other things like them."

Prisk added, "The portable classrooms which we own, but which stand empty, are unfortunately not strong enough to support the tonnage of the equipment we need to store."

It was proposed by board member Gary Lichtman, that the board pass a policy resolution which would prevent teachers and the individual schools from sponsoring trips or tours, and also that the descriptive material not be allowed to circulate in the schools.

Cortiss proposed that the motion be altered to allow the materials into the schools, but only with a formal notice that there is no school involvement.

Because this is a matter of policy, it was proposed by Hugh Stewart, a board member that a decision be postponed until the next meeting so that members may consider the matter and receive community input.

The motion was tabled until the next meeting, Tuesday, May 21.

Dems will host Frank Kelley

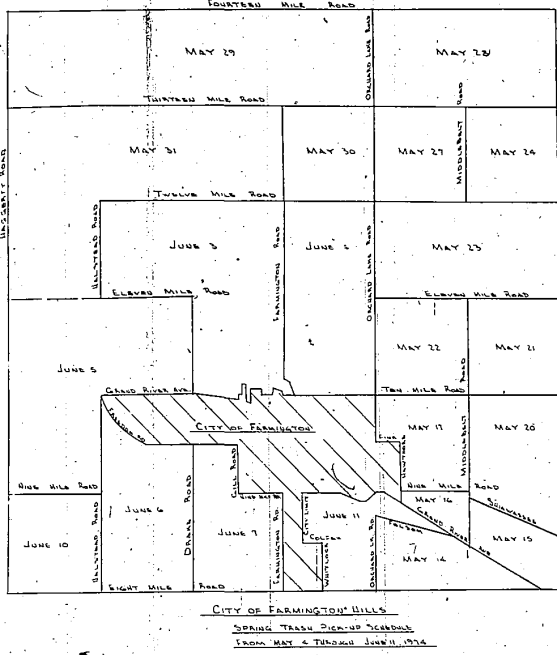

"Kelley is presently involved in a struggle to stop the Michigan Public Service Commission from granting repeated rate increases to the Utilities. At the same time his office has been involved in a concerted effort to

protect consumers against fraud, deceptive sales practices and misrepresentations of products. Frank Kelley is also a major supporter of strong controls aimed at curbing the influence of lobbyists over Michigan government.

"In view of public concern over consumer issues and soaring utility rates, Frank Kelley will prove to be a timely speaker."

Tickets for the dinner are \$7.50, according to Ms. Ogden. "As our contribution to fighting inflation we have reduced the price of dinner tickets to \$7.50 from the previous \$10," she said.



Spring pickup is scheduled

Farmington Hills residents can leave large junk items for the city to pick up beginning May 14 in some neighborhoods.

The schedule, released by city hall on Friday, calls for the annual spring pickup to completely cover the city by June 11.

Among the large junk items which will be picked up on the scheduled days are: refrigerators and freezers with doors off; ranges, washers and hot water tanks; household furniture cut to fit into truck hoppers; building materials cut in four foot lengths;

Doors cut in two, brush cut into three foot lengths and not over two inches in diameter, or any miscellaneous items which will fit into the truck hoppers.

Junk cars will be picked up, but only after they have been cleared through the Farmington Hills Police Dept.

Residents with junk car problems should contact the city zoning office for necessary information and assistance.

The pickup will not include: garbage, tree trunks, dirt, cement or other materials too long to get into the truck hopper.

City officials noted subdivision associations and other organizations are asked to plan their cleanups to coincide with the special trash pickup scheduled by the city.

The complete schedule is on the map accompanying this article. The schedule is not the same as the regular trash pickup.
