

BCDS planning annual festival

An old-fashioned country fair will unroll on the green acreage of Bloomfield Country Day School (BCDS) Saturday when the school sponsors its annual Strawberry Festival.



Also dubbed "An Old Fashioned Day in the Country," the fair will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the school grounds, 1650 E. Square Lake Road, Bloomfield Hills.

Among the offerings planned by parents, students and faculty at the school are a bake sale, a cake walk, candy, desserts, with special emphasis on strawberries for shortcake, pie and sundaes, a flea market, games, rides, a surprise barrel and a Strawberry-mushroom-geranium sale.

STUDENT-PRODUCED arts and crafts will be available and Ups and Downs of Oakland Mall, Troy, has donated \$25,000 worth of teen-age fashions for the fair. Proceeds from the sale of the clothes will benefit BCDS.

The entire festival will benefit the school expansion fund. On Jan. 30, ground was broken for a new library and two new classrooms.

"It's just a quiet country fair, but without itself," said Mrs. Robert VanderKloot of Bloomfield Hills, a MRS. VANDERKLOOT, and Mrs. Dean Buchanan are chairmen of a boutique booth at the fair which will display jewelry, gifts for dolls, denim articles, plastics, hand-fashioned purses, strawberry soup, caudles and flower pails.

Edison searches for patio king

Detroit Edison's residential consumer services division is again turning its attention to the men cooks of Southeastern Michigan and seeking its 10th King of the Patio.

In announcing the annual contest, Kathryn D. Riney, head of the division, said that this year special emphasis will be placed on the efficient use of portable outdoor cooking appliances.

"Besides being fun, patio cooking cuts down on indoor heat and portable appliances so popular with outdoor cooks assist in the wise use of energy because they are thermostatically controlled," she said.

The first phase of the contest will run through Memorial Day, May 27. From written recipes received, 10 men will be chosen to take part in a simulated outdoor cook-off at Detroit Edison's downtown Detroit headquarters on Wednesday afternoon, June 12.

GRAND PRIZE to be awarded will be a complete patio ensemble, an insulated 30-cup coffee maker and electric grill and patio cart.

Second prize will be a "Thrifty Combo," consisting of a rotisserie-broiler and a Super Pot. A "Patio Duo," an electric skillet with broiler lid and a blender-ice crusher,

will be given to the man who comes in third.

The seven runners-up also will receive electric appliances.

Miss Riney announced that the contest judges will be Len Barnes of Motor News; Mark Bellaire, Detroit Free Press columnist; Lee Murray of Murray Bernard Associates; Mort Neff of Michigan Outdoors; George Pierrot of George Pierrot Productions, Inc.; Cynthia Riley, Detroit News Household Editor; Roosevelt Roscoe, Detroit Press Club chef; and food writer Kay Savage.
