How do you make money at the race track!

It's simple, according to Bob Kal-ish, the prominent Southfield sports-man who owns one of the most suc-essful stables in Michigan harness racing. His horses, trained and driven by Tom Merriman are run-ning again at Hazel Park Race-way. The season will run through \u00e4 June 25.

Kalish explained what it takes to make money at the race track: "You need a good driver-rainer, a good vet, a good partner, good stock and money. I have the best. Tom Merriman is my driver-trainer. Dr. Mike Hall is my vet. My wife, Fanny, is my partner. This is a great team."

Kalish added one more require-ment: "You need luck, and a lot of it. Put them together and you have a great team."

Kalish is the David Harum of the standardbred sport, known for his ability to take losers and turn them tho winners. He has acquired many of his horses via the claiming route. He and Merriman whate all the decisions on these claims. He operates his stable like an efficiency expert.

IF A HORSE doesn't make money for him, he gets rid of it.

"I don't fall in love with any of them." Kalish said. "This is a busi-ness. I have to show a profit. If a horse can't win in a higher classifi-cation. I move him downward.

"But I won't keep a horse that can't make it as a \$7.500 claimer. A CHEAP HORSE EATS JUST AS MUCH as a good horse."

Kalish added: "I like to keep my stable at 10 head. Since the present Hazel Park meeting started in late March. I've had a turnover of 50 per cent in my stable. That's not unusual."

unusual. Merriman who has trained and driven exclusively for Kalish for the past 16 years, won the driving championship at Hazel Park in 1970. He has a good chance to do it again this year. Kalish campaignes on the Hazel Park Northytile wolverine circuit, and his horses always give a good account of themselves.

"Wherever we go, they know we've been there," Kalish said. They do, indeed. The Southfield owner and the Wayne, Mich. driver are one of the most enduring and formidable alignments in Mich-
