# 3 candidates, 4 mills, to be decided

FARMINGTON — Voters will
be going to the polls Monday, to
elect three school board members
and decide whether to approve a
four-mill increase in the voted tax
rate of the district.
Running for a one-year term is
Mrs. Ann T. Rodewig, Maynard

The millage is supported by all the candidates with the exception of Duke.

The Farmington Chamber of Commerce also adopted a resolu-tion supporting the increase.

The West Bloomfield-Farmington Area League of Women Voters and the Farmington PTA Council have invited the candidates in the Farmington School Board election to speak/ at a candidates rally on Thursday, June 6.

The rally will be held at 8 p.m. in East Junior High School, 25000 Middle Belt Road in Farmington Hills.

The public is invited to attend the rally which will be the last time before the election that the candidates will all be appearing together.

The co-chairmen of the rally are Mrs. Helen Prutow, who is a member of the League and Ed Miller of the PTA Council.

Mrs. Prutow said, "After each candidate makes a brief statement, there will be ample time for the audience to ask questions of any or all of the candidates.

In asking for the increase, the school board is aiming at making improvements to the physical plant, including buildings and grounds, and adding to the program and staff beyond what was available this year.

The cost to the taxpayer varies depending what part of the district the property owner resides in.

THE TAX RATE levied by the schools for Farmington area residents was reduced for the coming year by two actions of the board of education.

A 1.4-mill "variable millage," levied this year, was dropped, and a 1.0 mill request to pay off school bond issues, was also dropped.

The result is the rate for the Farmington area residents would ou p 1.6 mills if the issue is approved. Assessments have also gone up in the area, which raises the tax bill for all local units—city, county and schools, approximately 10 percent.


West Bloomfield residents would not see a change from the "variable millage," and they are voting on a three-mill hike.

A home valued at \$40,000, assessed at \$20,000, would see the
school taxes increase approximately \$32, in Farmington and
Farmington Hills, or \$50 per year
in West Bloomfield, if the increase
is approved. The same homeowner
will have an additional increase if
his house were reassessed, regardless, of whether the millage passes.

THE DECISION to drop the variable millage, and then ask for a four-mill increase, put he schools in a position, if it fails, of not having enough to maintain the operation at last year's level.

The projected budget for next year is \$21.6 million, up approximately \$2.4 million from last year, according to William Prisk, business manager.

### Hills is suing policemen on contract wording error agreement between the city and the officers that all increases were to apply to the adjusted base pay.

The City of Farmington Hills is suing the Police Officers Association to amend a mistake in its contract with the police officers which could cost the city as much as \$151,000.

could cost the city as much as 151,000. The mistake concerns a formula which lists the cost of living increases which the officers are to receive every October and April. The city has a contract with both the patrolmen and the command officers. The formula was the same in each contract, however the command officers have already agreed to the contract Addustment. The police officery association

has not accepted the adjustment for the patrolmen. On May 23 the city began civil action against the association to get a "reformation of contract."
