

Co-op students honor employers

The co-op programs at the Farmington high schools ended with a special luncheon for the students and employers.

The retailing section had lunch at the Farmington Elks Club, the first luncheon honoring the employers since the program began.

The nursing arts program held its luncheon at Vladimirs.

Although the official title of the program is nursing arts, the addition this year of a dental assistant program caused co-op directors to change it to Health Occupations.

At both luncheons certificates were presented to employers who had been with the program for three years and to those who had been with the program five or more years.

Students in the retail co-op made banners for their employers which were used to decorate the hall.

A Co-op student, Mark Hauswirth, who has been working at Wesley Berry Florist designed the center piece for the head table.

Another co-op student Lynne Dorando of Farmington High designed the program cover.

The retail program started ten years ago with only 30 students and has grown over the years to the point

where 350 students are now participating in it.

Students are placed in businesses where they can get experience in the retail field. The program apparently works out well for both the students who get the practical experience and the employers who take the time to train them.

This year out of the 43 students who are graduating, 31 of them are planning on staying with their employers.

Entertainment at the program was provided by James Carmody, a Farmington Co-op student who did a magic act and served as master of ceremonies.

School superintendent Martinus Van Amedy gave the welcoming address and Lynn Nutter, principal at North Farmington, presented the awards. North Farmington student, Rick Wallace presented a piano interlude.

The co-op certificates were presented to the graduating seniors by Mrs. June Kilmer, director of the retailing program.

Guest speaker at the Health Occupations luncheon was Stuart Pernick, D.D.S.

Mrs. Hildegard Grysh, R.N., director of the health occupations co-op program said, "We asked a dentist to be our speaker this year since this is the first year we have included dental assistants in our program."

The invocation at the program was given by Darcy Walker, a Harrison senior. The other speakers were Cheryl Hayes, a Farmington High senior and Lewis Schulman, assistant superintendent of schools. Schulman presented the awards to the employers.

Nursing co-op students work in the area hospitals, nursing homes, and dentists and doctors offices.
