

## **Elementary** projects earn awards

FARMINGTON HILLS — Awards were given to three ele-mentary schools for the work they have done in the "Keep Farming-ton Beautiful" program. The awards were presented to student and leacher representa-tives from the schools at the Farm-ington Hills Council meeting, Tuesday night by Farmington Hills Mayor, Robert McConnell.

The school purchased bird feed-ers which were placed around the school grounds to attract more birds to the area. Several students entered the Farmington Kiwanis Club Bird House Contest. Six of the students won prizes for their efforts.

The students also passed out lit-ter bags, attended nature study programs and planted tree see-dlings at Oakland Community College.

SHIAWASSEE principal Ron-ald Jackson and Mrs. Kennedy-headed the Shiawassee program. The school held a general clean up day. Oct. 9, in which all the stu-dents participated.

The student and teacher beauti-fication committee purchased six, trash receptacales for outside the building. The students set up a schedule for taking the recepta-cales in and out of the building.

The first graders and their par-ents and teachers built a sand box with materials which were do-nated by the parents.

An after school garden club has been responsible for planting shrubs around the school and starting a vegetable garden.

Students at Middlebelt school built playground equipment using old tires, and telephone poles among other things.

THE STUDENTS also built planters, seeded bare areas around the school, developed nature trails and cleaned up the woods behind the school.

They have also organized the MAPC (Middlebelt Anti-Pollution Club). The club organized a clean up day, encouraged parents to or-ganize car pools and had an alumi-num collection drive.

Proceeds from the aluminum collection drive were used to pur-chase a tree for the school.
