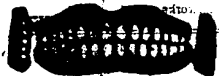

Change in Game Laws.

Hunters will be interested to learn that in the closing hours the legislature amended the game law so as to prohibit the killing of quails, fox, grey and black squirrels for a period of five years. While quite a number were killed last fall, a goodly number were left and with the birds undisturbed for five years and favorable weather conditions they should become very plentiful.

Government Whitewash.

The whitewash which the government recommends for the interior of cow barns is made according to the following recipe: Take half a bushel of unslaked lime, slake with boiling water and cover during the process to keep in steam. Strain through a fine sieve or strainer and add to it a peck of salt previously dissolved in warm water. Add three pounds of ground rice boiled to a thin paste, stirring in while hot. Add five gallons of hot water to the mix-ture, stir well and let stand for a few days, covered by nearly air tight as possible. When ready for use the wash may be colored by adding ochre, lampblack or bluing to suit.
