## Black walnut roots a threat

Is there any truth to the idea that a black walnut tree near the vegetable garden will stunt or kill the plants? The answer is, yes. Black walnut trees are highly prized for nuts and timber but are scomed near a vegetable garden. Here are answers to some questions we have received about black walnuts:

Do the roots of the black walnut really secrete a poison?
Answer: Yes. The roots contain a phytoxin (plant poison) called Jugione. This compound is not secreted into the soil, but when susceptible plants touch the roots, injury occurs. How far is the toxin zone?
Answer: The range is as far out as the spread of the root system, anywhere from 50 to 60 feet, and up to 50 feet.

What are the susceptible plants? What are the susceptible plants - Answer; As far as, we know, no one has put out a list yet. Highly susceptible plants include many evergreens, azalaes, rhododendrons, and many vegetables such as tomatoes, corn, po-

dose of Epsom salts and borax. The ideal way to spray your meloss is when the vines start to run, and again when the fruits are between one and two inches in diameter. Field recommendations are to add four pounds of magresium sulphate (Epsom salts) and two pounds of borax to 100 gallons of water. For the home garden, this figures out to 5½ tablespoons of Epsom salts and 3½ tablespoons of Epsom salts and 3½ tablespoons of borax (household type) to five gallons of water. GREEN THUMB CLINIC: "I planted a peach tree this spring and it leafed out micely. Now I notice a sticky substance coming from the trunk. Is this harmful?"
