Park reflects lumbering era

At Hartwick Pines State Park near Grayling, one of Michigan's most popular parks, a visitor may walk among huge, towering white pine and relieve the state's past ilumbering era or just enjoy the quiet offered by a deep forest, according to Automobile Club Michigans.

The visite pine, the last such remaining tract in the Lower Peninsula. Hartwick Pines is a living, lasting monument to the lumber era between 1840 and 1900 when vigni forests carpted Michigan's. Upper and Lower Peninsulas. Hartwick Pines is seven miles northeast of Grayling on M-93. A tour of the park will cost a carbad of visitors either \$1 for a one-day entrance permit or \$5 for a season entrance sticker that can be used at all Michigan state parks.
