Gas attendant gets surprise

FARMINGTON — Kenneth Kirkson of Detroit learned the hard way that it is best to let sleeping dogs — or in this case, sleeping gas station attendants — lay.

City DiPalacio, owner of the Ole Toll Shell station on Grand River and Halstead Road was sleeping in his station while awaiting a gas delivery early Tuesday morning.

In the middle of his nap he heard a brick crash through the window of the service station and saw someone enter the building.

DiPalacio grabbed his gun, fired two shots, and then called Farmington police. What followed was like a scene at a carnival shooting gallery.

The intruder, Kirkson, hid behind a wrecker and every time he would pop his head up DiPalacio would fire.

"I wasn't trying to hit him," DiPalacio said.

"Actually after I fired the first two shots I called the police. When I came back I didn't know where he was until he popped his head up then I fired at him again."

He fired four times before the Farmington police arrived. Capt. Byrnes of the Farmington police said, "I think he (Kirkson) was actually relieved when we came and took him."

Kirkson is currently being held by the Farmington police.

Scottish dancers are taking fling

Bad arches and weak lugs have kept Diana MacPhee from doing what she really wants to do, but fortunately she has found an acceptable substitute.

At the age of six, Miss MacPhee asked her father, a professional bagpiper, to teach her to play the bagpipes. He rerouted her enthusiasm into dancing, however, because girls aren't supposed to be able to play the bagpipes.

"Their lugs are weak," he said. So Miss MacPhee learned Scottish Highland dancing instead. She became proficient enough that she reached the top echelon of Highland dancing and won more than 100 medals within eight years.

Then, at the age of 14, the doctor told her she shouldn't dance anymore because she had bad arches. Now that bagpiping and dancing both were off, a determined Miss MacPhee put her skills to work teaching Highland dancing.

Now one of 15 Highland dancing teachers in the area, Miss MacPhee has about 15 students she teaches in the basement of her grandmother's home in Northville.

As a member of the United States Highland Dancing Association, Miss MacPhee's class will be going on a trip to Scotland in August 1975, to compete in various dancing festivals. Approximately 250 dancers from Plymouth, Livonia, Garden City, Northville, Redford, Farmington and other surrounding communities will be participating.

Each teacher is in charge of raising funds for her class. It is estimated the trip will cost each student about \$300. Dance recitals and garage sales have been held to raise money and other fund-raisers are being planned.

Most of Miss MacPhee's students are girls. However, there are a few boys. Most range in age from five to 18, but there is no age limit.

There are five different levels in Highland dancing: baby (anyone up to seven years), beginner, novice, intermediate, and open. A student has to win three medals at one level before she can move up to the next level. Although you can go no higher than the open level, Miss MacPhee says it is a continual learning process.

To be a Highland dancing teacher, one must have reached the highest level and be at least 16 years old. Miss MacPhee is 17 and has been teaching since September. She is a

junior at Northville High School. There are about nine different competitions held in the area throughout the year, with the main event held in May at Oakland University.

Miss MacPhee says it usually takes about six to eight months of lessons before a student is ready for competition.

Some of the dancers are the Highland Fling, Sword Dance, Sean Trews, Scottish version of the Irish jig, Sailor's Horn Pipe, Scottish Reel and other nationalistic dances.

Costumes for the dancers are kilts with matching socks, vest, blouse and Highland dancing shoes, special shoes similar to ballet shoes.

Last month, Miss MacPhee will be taking her nine-year-old sister, Donna, to Scotland to compete in the Edinburgh Festival and Sterling Highland Games. Donna has also won more than 100 medals and 39 trophies in Highland dancing competition.

Miss MacPhee has worked up a tremendous amount of enthusiasm for teaching dancing and at this point has no thoughts of giving it up.

She hopes some day to be able to dance again, depending on arches. As for the bagpipes, she has decided to leave that to her father and her brother.

ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village shall apply to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village to be registered in the Township, City or Village in which he is located by legal proxy, and the person so registered shall be entitled to vote at the election. The elector shall submit to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village a written statement of the elector's inability to appear in person, and the statement shall be signed by the elector or by another person authorized by the elector to sign his name on the line for the elector's signature. The statement shall be filed with the Clerk of the Township, City or Village and the elector shall appear at the election and vote in person.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 497. The elector of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, City or Village in which he is located or is entitled to vote. (As amended by Act No. 116, P. A. 1954)

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any elector who has moved from one Township, City or Village to another Township, City or Village shall be entitled to transfer his registration from the Township, City or Village in which he was previously registered to the Township, City or Village in which he is now residing. The elector shall apply to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which he is now residing and shall submit to the Clerk a written statement of the elector's move, and the statement shall be signed by the elector or by another person authorized by the elector to sign his name on the line for the elector's signature. The statement shall be filed with the Clerk of the Township, City or Village and the elector shall appear at the election and vote in person.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any elector who has moved from one Township, City or Village to another Township, City or Village shall be entitled to transfer his registration from the Township, City or Village in which he was previously registered to the Township, City or Village in which he is now residing. The elector shall apply to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which he is now residing and shall submit to the Clerk a written statement of the elector's move, and the statement shall be signed by the elector or by another person authorized by the elector to sign his name on the line for the elector's signature. The statement shall be filed with the Clerk of the Township, City or Village and the elector shall appear at the election and vote in person.
