Rohn said he had always been interested in old cars but did not actually begin resorting them until his sor was old enough to work on the too.


"When my son Degan to show an interest in old cars I just thought it would be a good hobby for the family to share," Rohn said.

Rohn did participate in the first two day activities which included visits to several sites in the area connected with the Ford family and the Model T.


