"We don't care to have the Republican Party's trash dumped in our front lawn," Mrs. Howe said, referring to former Republican Oakland County Drain Commissioner Daniel W. Barry, who is a Democratic candidate for county executive.

BARRY SERVED as a Repub-lican Drain Commissioner for 15 years before he was removed from office on a 1971 conflict of interest charge.

Although the conflict of interest conviction was overturned by the Michigan Court of Appeals last week, Barry still faces felony charges of misuse of public funds,

conspiracy and bribery as a result of the 1971 citizens' grand jury investigation.

Barry ran for the drain commis-sioner post again as an unendorsed

sioner post again as an unendorsed Republican in 1972 and was de-feated in the primary.

THE OUSTED county official will oppose Kuthy in the August 6th primary election. The winner of that race will face the Republicar's nomine Daniel T. Murphy, presently the appointed county executive and chairman of the board of auditors.
