

# Barry worries county Democrats

## Harrison cheerleader memorial is proposed

A memorial is being considered for Barbara Jo Ann Gully, 17, 26181 Kiltarton, captain of the Harrison High cheerleaders, who was killed by lightning while vacationing in Colorado.

Miss Gully was struck by a bolt of lightning when she left her family's car at Summit Ridge Rd. observation spot near Denver, Colo. She died later in a hospital.

She was remembered as a bright, active girl in love with sports. She had expected to try out for basketball in the fall, in addition to her cheerleading activities.

She was a member of St. Alexander's Catholic Church.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford A. Gully, said they expected to set up a memorial fund with the contributions sent in, although the plans have not been finalized.

Miss Gully is survived by her parents, her sisters and brothers, Matthew, Michael Clifford, Donald, Cathy, Carol and Patricia.

OAKLAND COUNTY — When candidates filed their petitions last month, county political wags joked about Daniel W. Barry who is seeking the Democratic nomination for county executive on the Aug. 6 primary ballot.

But now the laughter has died down and Democrats admittedly are worried, according to Bernard Winograd, Democratic Party executive secretary.

"If enough people don't know who Daniel Barry is on election day he will win," Winograd predicted.

BARRY served as a Republican Drain Commissioner in Oakland County for 15 years before he was removed from office on a 1971 conflict of interest charge.

The conflict of interest conviction was overturned by the Michigan Court of Appeals recently. However Barry still faces felony charges of misuse of public funds, conspiracy and bribery as a result

of a 1971 citizen's grand jury investigation.

Barry ran for the drain commissioner post again as an unendorsed Republican in 1972 and was defeated in the primary.

Since 1972 Barry has not been active politically. His filing for the county executive race as a Democrat surprised members of both major political parties.

Barry will oppose Eugene W. Kuthy, of Orchard Lake, a management consultant, and the Democratic Party's choice for the executive post.

KUTHY is relatively unknown by the voters despite his active participation in Democratic politics and membership in several legal associations, the Oakland County Planning Commission, Pontiac Urban League and several Oakland Community College committees.

"Barry's name, for whatever reason, is better known than Gene Kuthy's who has never run for an office before," Winograd said.



"We must make sure that everybody knows who Dan Barry is and who Gene Kuthy is on election day," he added.

The party executive said however that he "does not believe" the popular theory that the amount of negative publicity a candidate receives means nothing as "long as you spell his name right."

"NOBODY" could believe it," said Republican caucus chairman Wilbur V. Brotherton, referring to Barry's candidacy. Brotherton is a

county commissioner from Farmington.

"The way he left office was something we couldn't be proud of," he said, adding that the Republicans would have been upset if Barry had sought to enter the race on their ticket.

"With the way that department (the drain commission) was run under his direction it's impossible for me to believe that the voters of Oakland County would want to let him run the entire county," Brotherton said.

## FAAC gets contract with Hills

FARMINGTON — The Farmington Hills Council and the Farmington Area Advisory Council have entered into an agreement which would allow the FAAC to continue the city's aid to the program for another year, until July 1975.

Under the terms of the agreement the city agreed to pay the FAAC \$12,000 for "services rendered."

The FAAC contract calls for counseling services telephone intervention service, group services, and educational programs according to the agreement.

The vote to continue the agreement was a four to three decision, with Mrs. Joan Dudley, Frederick Lichtman, and William Ortman, casting the opposition votes.

Any services rendered by the group must be under the direct supervision of the FAAC's professional staff.

Members of the professional staff are required to have at least a BA in either the social sciences or a related field, and must be pursuing a graduate degree.

The FAAC is also required to submit quarterly reports to the city council which outline the number of cases handled, the number of staff members and volunteers and a statement of receipts and expenditures.

## Duquette passes bar

Dennis W. Duquette, son of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Duquette, of Lorikay Drive in Farmington Hills, is one of 45 candidates who have passed the State Bar Examination.

He was admitted to practice May 29 in a ceremony presided over by Judge Frederick C. Ziem in the Oakland County Commissioners Auditorium.
