# Backpacking hiker walks across the entire state

A Southfield man who likes challenges recently completed a walk across the state of Michigan.

Marvin Kananen 28, an ex-school teacher, hiked from Tel-Twelve Mall to South Haven.

"I've never done anything quite so hard," he said.

"But you don't want to quit when you start something."

Kananen said his knees swelled up and the walk became very hard work.

A 1964 graduate of Southfield High School, he has been studying literature at Oakland University and formerly taught elementary school.

"I STARTED out hiking with another guy, John Huggill," he said, "but he gave up after just a day and a half."

"My walk last seven and a half days," he said. "I just wanted to see if I could make it."

Kananen kept needed supplies, such as foot creams, in a backpack.

He said sleeping was no problem at all.

"I slept off the road," he said. "There are lots of places to sleep."

"I slept in a swamp outside of Hell, Michigan; near a cemetery, in a grove of trees, and within sev-

eral feet of one county line," he said.

His walk took him due west but he constantly consulted maps.

"I met a lot of dogs on the trip but lucky didn't get bitten," Kananen said.

"A LOT OF people stopped and offered me rides, and it was a great temptation, but I didn't take them."

He said the people who got the "Biggest kick" out of his hike were

older people who would smile, wave and shout encouragement.

The walk may be the last for a while for Kananen who will enter the Peace Corps on Aug. 5.

"I will be teaching elementary science in Sierra Leone just 900 miles from Timbuktu," he said.

For Kananen who has taught on Indian reserves in Hannaville, Mich. and in Washington state, it will be his first trip outside of the country.

"I'm kind of scared and excited about it," he said, "because I'll be going into areas I'm not familiar with at all."

The boats will be made July 10 and the regatta race will be held in the institute's reflecting pool July 17.

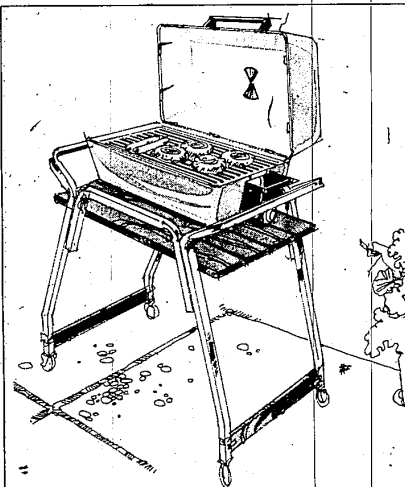

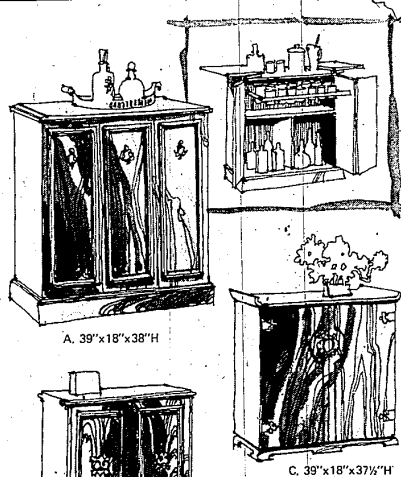
