He said the people who got the "Biggest Kick" out of his hike were

older people who would smile, wave and shout encouragement.

The walk may be the last for a while for Kananen who will enter the Peace Corps on Aug. 5.

"I will be teaching elementary science in Sierra Leone just 900 miles from Timbuckton," he said.

For Kananen who has taught on Indian reserves in Hannaville, Mich. and in Washington state, it will be his first trip outside of the country.




