## Death of a Former Resident.

The following, taken from the the Fremont Journal will undoubtedly be of interest to the readers of this paper, as Mrs. Thomas resided here at one time:

"The many friends of Mrs. Henry Thomas (nee Hazel Bell) of East State street, will be startled to hear of her death which occurred Thursday evening at 10:40 o'clock. At noon, Thursday, the attending physicians stated that they considered Mrs. Thomas' condition much improved over that of the previous day and much encouragement was noticed for a possible complete recovery.

"The death of Mrs. Thomas seems particularly sad on account of her age, being only 27 years old, and the fact that she leaves a young son of three years of age.

"She was just beginning life in one sense, and in the congenial companionship of her family had a happy future before her. She was one of the most talented young women in the city and contributed largely in a musical way to its entertainment, until her health debilitated her from taking any active part in musical affairs. Besides possessing talent in music she was a bright and clever young woman in a general way. She had a pleasant sunny disposition and was an agreeable companion to the many who were counted among her friends.

"Mrs. Thomas was born December 2, 1881, in Fremont, O., and has always made this city her home with the exception of a few months' residence in Michigan. June 15th, 1904, she was united in marriage to Henry E. Thomas.

While Mrs. Thomas had been in bad health for about two years there seemed to be no symptoms of any vital or enduring illness. The final cause of death being peritonitis. Mrs. Thomas leaves beside her husband and little son, her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Bell, and her grandmother, Mrs. Mary Bell, to grieve her absence and mourn the loss of one who was very dear to everyone in the home circle."

## WILD WEST AND FAR EAST

Many Interesting Features Will Be Seen at Buffalo Bill and Pawnee Bill Exhibitions

Rossi's musical elephants will be a particular feature of the Far East scene, and as an individual feature of the Wild West section of the exhibition, Ray Thompson's Trained Western Race horses will be shown in feats of grace and equine skill. Sharpshooting by Johnny Baker will be a particularly attractive feature, and a bunch of bucking bronchos will furnish the principal comedy element of a truly exhilarating and strenuous exhibition.
