

Festival features Ukrainians

The Ukrainians of metropolitan Detroit will take over the Cobo Hall riverfront Friday through Sunday for their annual ethnic festival.

The free festival will open at 6 p.m. Friday with the crowning of Queen Switlana Kot.

Ukrainian dancers from our Lady of Perpetual Help Ukrainian Catholic Church and the St. Marys

Protestant Ukrainian Orthodox Church will perform.

The Kolar Ukrainian Mandolin Orchestra, the Ondusky Family String Ensemble and the St. Michael's Ukrainian Youth Singers also will appear.

At 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, the Ukrainian National Women's League will model their distinctive native costumes.

NATIVE AND historical costumes, including replicas of clothing worn 1,000 years ago by Princess Olga and St. Vladimir the Great also will be modeled, under the direction of Oresta Karalah of Livonia.

Appearing at the festival will be the Shevchenko Bandurists Chorus. The chorus will feature soloists, duets, quartets and larger groups from Detroit and other cities.

The mini-cultural museum, a feature of each Ethnic Festival, will display the history of various regions, artifacts, miniature costumes and embroideries.

The intricate craft of designing Ukrainian Easter eggs, Pysanky, will be demonstrated throughout the weekend. Materials for making Pysanky at home will be available. Other crafts will include Ukrainian cross-stitching and embroidery.

ONE BOOTH will display a variety of Ukrainian embroidered articles, woodcarvings, ceramics, dolls and Pysanky.

Food for sale will include varenyky filled with potato, sauerkraut or cheese. There will be holubtsi of rice, meat and buckwheat; plus pirohy, tortes, pastry and bread.

Festival hours are 6 p.m. to 11 p.m. Friday and noon to 11 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Exhibit points up industry

This summer the country's first major bicentennial exhibition will be on display at the Henry Ford Museum at Greenfield Village.

"Industrial Heritage U.S.A." has been developed by the museum to commemorate the American bicentennial in cooperation with 26 industrial organizations.

The exhibition illustrates the drastic changes in life style and points up the improved standard of living resulting from the evolution of American industry. Individual exhibits trace the evolution of such diverse areas of American life as home entertainment, home lighting, the kitchen, the bath, farm equipment, clothing and electric power.

HUNDREDS OF ARTIFACTS have been selected for the exhibits from the vast collections of Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum to contrast the products of the past with those of today.

After Labor Day, the exhibition will begin an extensive tour of the country which will take it to every contiguous state by the end of 1976.

Each summer it will return to the Henry Ford Museum to be displayed during July and August among all the other collections that bring American history to life there.

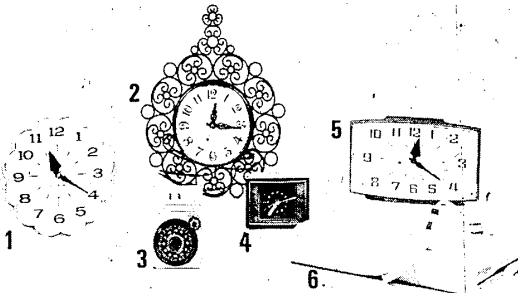

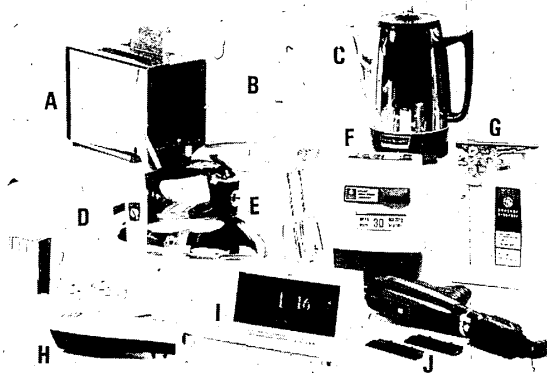
