# Gravel pits mean danger

The day (Iuly '9) was the sort of scorching summer day when all you wanted to do was find a col place and take it easy.

A 16-year-old Rochester youth found his cool place at the gravel pit off Hamlin Road near Ryan Road in Shelby Township.

He drowned in the pit about 2 p.m. that day.

The spot Michael Kumz chose was not unusual. Youths from Rochester, Avon Township, Shelby Township and other surrounding communities constantly flock to area gravel pits for fun in the sun.

The attractions to the pits are numerous. They are secluded, no admission is charged and no one to tell you what to do.

BUT THE QUIET, blue water is a deadly facade. It hides the hazards that make the pits places where teen age youths lose their lives having a good time.

Most gravel pits, according to Joseph Allard, an officer with the Macornb County Sheriff's Department's Marine Division, are spring fed.

This means the water temperature in the pits is often 20 to 40 degrees colder than the air temperature. Also are all police report.

"The kids dive into the water and the change in temperature is such a shock to the victim that he gets short of breath.

"They can't breath and the exhaustion they experience is almost tripled, they struggle to aget out of the cold water, lose strength and disappear," he said.
