FARMINGTON HILLS — Reg-ulations governing behavior in Farmington Hills eity parks will be considered by the Hills Council at their second meeting in Septem-ber.

An ordinance authorizing the city council to establish rules and regulations was unanimously adopted by the council at their meeting Monday night.

The ordinance gives the city the authority to establish rules and regulations, provides for the estab-lishment of an agency to enforce such rules, and outlines penalties and fines for violation of them.

However, it is strictly an enable-og ordinance and does not specifiing ordinance and does not cally list any regulations.

The city manager's office will present a list of recommendations for the rules and regulations at the council meeting in September.

The city decided to set up the rules for the parks after residents living near Waldron Park com-plained that it was being misused.

Payment may be made at the city offices in the municipal build-ing or at certain banks in the city.

The city recently posted signs add to and implement the city's establishing a curfew and prohi- penal code for further control of biting any motorized vehicles in noise pollution, rather than establish a new ordinance.

IN OTHER ACTION the coun-cil decided not to give the Farming-ton Arts Council a \$2,000 grant.

The Arts Council was requesting a grant from the Federal govern-ment which was contingent upon its receiving aid from local govern-The Arts Council had asked that the aid be in the form of services which would be provided for by the city.

The council will be discussing possible noise control amendments to the penal code at the Sept. S meeting.
