

Fall registration planned for community center classes

FARMINGTON — The Farmington Community Center has planned more than 60 different educational, hobby and exercise classes and workshops this fall. In all there will be 126 class offerings to take care of different levels of achievement and people who can only come daytimes or evenings. There is something for almost everyone, whether you are old or young or in between.

Registration will begin Sept. 11 at 10 a.m. with an Arts and Crafts Open House, and will continue until class maximums are reached. Sept. 11 and 12 have been set aside as "in person" registration days when arts and crafts to be taught this term will be on display.

On Wednesday, Sept. 11, only, many of the instructors of those classes will be at the Center to show and explain their work. Some instructors cannot be present because of other commitments, but they will send exhibits.

Barbara Burgess, ballet instructor, will be on hand both Wednesday and Thursday from 4-6 p.m. to help place prospective students in the proper classes.

No mail and phone enrollments can be handled until Friday, Sept. 13.

A number of classes will start the week of Sept. 23 but others will begin later and registration for these will continue until shortly before the scheduled date.

New classes added to many old favorites this fall include: Drapery Making; English Language Enrichment for Junior High students; Making Men's Slacks; "Checks, Gingham and Plaids" in Needlepoint; advanced Picture Framing Workshops; Quilt Finishing; Advanced Quilt Sampler course featuring complete quilt making skills; Riding in cooperation with Oak Ridge Farm Stables; Tole Painting; Advanced Weaving; Woodcarving and a number of new workshops.

The Woodcarving classes for beginning and advanced students

are not even listed in the Fall brochure as the center just found an instructor for this rarely taught art.

"The Exciting Challenge of Estate Planning," while not new to the center, is offered only once a year.

"The 'old favorites' category represents the majority of the center's offerings.

There are exercise classes: karate, gymnastics, yoga, and adult ballet. On the long list of arts and crafts classes, there are some that are unique in the Detroit area.

The center's Chinese Cooking, Crewel Embroidery, Interior Decorating, Picture Framing, Sampler Quilt Workshop, Sewing, Stained Glass, Swedish Strawcraft, Tinsel Painting, are examples of unusual approaches to these subjects.

Other classes such as Candlecraft, Crocheting, Decoupage, Drapery Making, Dried Flower Arrangements, Jewelry, Men's Slacks, Needlepoint, Oil Painting, Rug Hooking, Watercolor, Weaving, Williamsburg Christmas Decorations are on other programs but the center has some of the same in-

structors or outstanding instructors of its own.

Brochures describing the class offerings in detail have been mailed to 16,000 families in the area, but they were unavoidably delayed for several days in the addressing process. For this reason, the center said it would especially welcome your coming Sept. 11 to see what they have to offer.
