Mina Kedem takes her students on a long and fascinating voyage. The petite, dark-haired Israeli teaches American teen-agers about Israeli history.

"Israel is not so rich, but it is rich in history. Here, every stone speaks." EVERY nine, weeks, Mrs. Kedem begins a new ocurse of teaching with an eager group of new students. By now, she estimates that in the past year since the program began, she has taught nearly 200 American youngsters. Most of the students are from the Miami area and are sponsored by the Jewish Federation of Miami.

An expansion to other areas is gradually taking place. THE COURSE of study begins in an area near Tel Aviv, but the students journey not only through history, but through much of the tiny nation of Israel to learn their history and geogra-

"Their studies become more than just information," she explained.
"It's a very honest and serious pro-gram and the students get very in-volved."

Mrs. Kedem is an "almost Sabra" or native of Israel, having come to the country from Poland at the age of four.


THOUSANDS OF INFANTS are born annually in the United States alone with the hip irregularities which will be the concern of the symposium. The deformity is more common in girl babies than in boy, more prevaient on the left side than on the right, and more frequently seen in the winter than in the warm months. It occurs throughout the world, but in the United States it usually afflicts white babies, seldom black babies. Doctors do not know the reasons for these discrepancies.

Detection of hip deformity soon after birth enables effective treatment in most cases, but correction becomes more difficult after an affected child begins to walk, according to Ir. Stanko Stanisavljevic, chief of Bedumont's Department of Orthopedic Strgery. The symposium is the result of arrangements initiated three years ago by Dr. Stanko.

"CONGENTIAL HIP is fairly frequent in the United States, but its cause its not known." Dr. Stanko explains. "One of the goals of our symposium is to see whether the work lift any of the world authorities who will participate has produced any clues."
