Festival feasts are fantastic

Calorie watchers had better beware for the 1974 Plymouth Fall Festival is a virtual smorgasbord of culinary delights.

The feast begins Thursday, Sept. 5, with a German dinner from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m., sponsored by the Business and Professional Women's Club.

Knackwurst, bratwurst, potato salad, rolls and sauerkraut will bring the Rhineland to Kellogg Park along with German dancers and band. Hot dogs will be available for those who don't like the authentic German fare.

THE LION'S Club Fish Fry will be the next attraction, Friday, Sept. 6, from 11:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. next to the Penn Theater. The dinner also includes French fried potatoes, cole slaw, roll and butter and a beverage.

The Masonic Temple is the place to be Saturday, Sept. 7, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. when the Kiwanis Club provides hot golden pancakes, sausages, coffee and milk.

Also on Saturday, will be the Jaycee-sponsored beef rib dinner from 5 to 10 p.m., next to the Penn Theater. Corn on the cob, potato chips, roll, coffee or milk and ice cream will be provided.

Sunday, Sept. 8, is the day for the

dean of Fall Festival service club dinners, the annual Rotary Club chicken barbecue, from noon to 6 p.m., next to the Masonic Lodge.

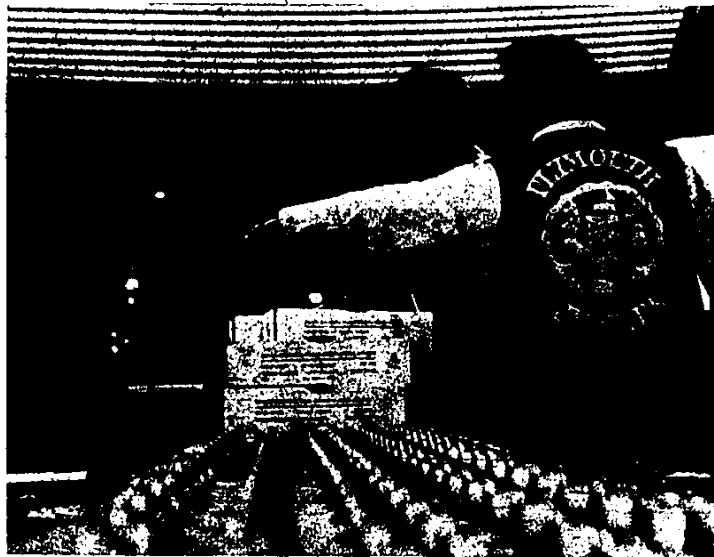
THIS YEAR, for the first time ever, a chicken sub-station will be located at the corner of Ann Arbor Road and Lilley. Complete chicken dinners will be available on a drive-in, carry-out basis from noon to 6 p.m.

Each year the barbecue grows in size and the Rotary Club experiences record sales. Last year 15,000 pounds of chicken were bought and ended up in 14,500 dinners.

But the barbecue's beginnings were more modest. The Joy and Wing playground was the scene of the first barbecue in 1956, which drew a crowd of 150, mostly Rotary members and their families.

In 1960, the barbecue expanded into a fall festival and moved to new quarters in Kellogg Park. Over the years, the festival has expanded along with the barbecue, growing in length from a one to four day event.

This year, the Rotary Club expects another record breaking crowd to sample its crowd pleasing dinner, which includes corn, roll, and of course the chicken.
