

Antique mart draws 22 dealers

Fond of old things?
Like to browse around in antique shops?

Enjoy seeing what dealers in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana have to offer as well as area entrepreneurs?

You say there's a fuel shortage and you haven't the time?

The Plymouth Symphony League brings them all together in its 12th annual antique mart during the Plymouth Fall Festival.

Assembled under one roof in the Cultural Center on Farmer Street will be 22 dealers. Several private collectors whose wares are available to the pub-

lic only once or twice a year at selected shows, will be there.

The four out-of-state dealers are a real find according to the show's co-chairmen, Betty Zimmerman and Betty Laird. They expect them to bring an exceptional group of primitives, pewter, Staffordshire and old glass.

Bart Isaacson of Redford Township will be there with his beautiful Tiffany lamps. Les Werbel of Ann Arbor will feature oriental items in his booth.

League hostesses in Shaker costumes will greet visitors to the three-day mart which opens Friday, Sept. 6. Show hours are noon to 9 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and noon until 7 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 8.

'Young at art'

Young Plymouth artists and craftsmen will have an outlet for their creations during a two-day sale and show in Plymouth Central School.

The show is sponsored by the Plymouth Community Arts Council. Dee Shulte and Lillian Payne are in charge of the booth which opens at noon Saturday and Sunday. Closing hours are 9 p.m. on Saturday and 7 p.m. on Sunday.

A great selection of handwork, rang-

ing in price from two cents to \$30 dollars, will be available.

Last year's works included: bookmarks (the two-cent items), macramé, shell work, bead work, oil paintings, block prints, weaving, candles, soaps, plaques, paper tole, ink and pencil drawings.

Probably the best bargains of the Fall Festival can be found at the show. The young craftsmen donate 10 per cent of the sales price to the PCAC for handling. Last year sales totaled more than \$1,500.

Thespians appear

After four years as a group, the International Dramatic Society, Thespians Troop 354 of Plymouth, has gotten it together for a booth at the Fall Festival.

Under the direction of Mrs. Gloria Logan, drama director at Plymouth-Salem High School, the society will

apply stage make-up to festival-goers in the image of such characters as wolfman, Raggedy Ann and Andy, hobos, clowns and glamour girls.

And for the really far out people, you can even have a third eye added to the middle of your forehead.

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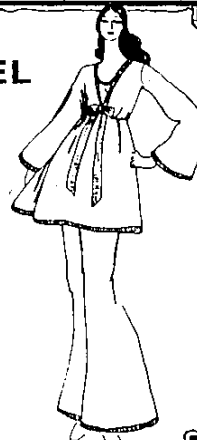
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
