For Dale, who began taking bike trips back in 10th grade, this was the culmination of five years of careful planning.

HIS 4,000 MILE jaunt began July 20 in San Diego and it took Dale approximately 11 days to ride through California. Going through the dangerous mountain curves around Big Sur was a frightening experience for Shipman. More than once he had second thoughts on whether he would come out of them alive. Upon hitting Oregon, Dale ran up against 60 mph head winds which cut has speed to less then 10 mph. He had his share of breakdowns also. Back in California, a spoke had snapped on his bike, and in Oregon another one went, setting off a chain reaction of broken spokes, a bent wheel and aske, and crushed bearings.
