King Henry to reign at Glyndebourne picnic

That "best of men and most excellent of princes," King Henry VIII of England, will provide the theme for this year's seventh annual Glyndebourne Picnic.

The picnic, sponsored by Friends of the Kresge Library, is a glittering black-tie affair which takes its name from an annual festival in England where guests picnic on the grounds of an estate in Sussex while listening to an opera.

The gala event will take place at the indoor Meadow Brook Riding Ring. The ring, now almost barren, will be transformed into a well-planned English picnic setting complete with castle, decorated in reds and golds, and a moat.

Various chairmen of the event got a preview at a mini-picnic held Sunday at Meadow Brook, following a reception at the Bloomfield Hills home of the general chairmen, Mr. and Mrs. Alan G. Loofbourrow.

AN EXPERT in traffic control from Chrysler Corp. will lend his

talents to directing an efficient flow of vehicles to make entrance and exit from the picnic less harrowing than it has been in recent years.

Those people reserving tables may have to pack not only their own silver, crystal and china, but also their own tablecloths.

The company originally donating the cloths has changed ownership and it isn't sure whether it will have enough on hand for the evening.

Attendance is estimated to be about 550, although only 95 invitations have been returned to date.

All money received from the Glyndebourne Picnic will be donated to Oakland University's Kresge Library for the purchase of books for the new O.U. School of Nursing.

Each person who is issued a ticket will also receive a library membership card, entitling them to use of the library facilities.

The picnic starts at 7:30 p.m. and there will be feasting and dancing until 1 a.m.

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
