Glass center is approved

FARMINGTON HILLS — The city council has agreed to supply the funding for the glass recycling center storage building which will be located at the rear of the municipal building parking lot.

At a previous meeting the council had agreed to provide the concrete slab at the rear of the lot for the base of the recycling center.

Aside from the initial costs of setting up the center, all further costs of the recycling program will be handled by the Earth Alive Organization.

Volunteers from Earth Alive will man the center Saturday mornings, and the organization will cost assume the cost of transporting the glass to the Owens-Illinois Corporation in Charlotte, Michigan which will then recycle it into new bottles.

The shelter which the city is providing will cost \$2,450.

It will be an 18'x21'6" free-standing enclosed Mansard carport. The county will be supplying three containers for the bottles. The recycling center will be open Oct. 5.
