

WHEN DUMMY was exposed, Christel was not overwhelmed with her chances. She had a sure loser in hearts, a likely loser in trumps and if she had to attack clubs herself, there were two more losers.

She won the diamond opening with the ace in her hand. The obvious play is to cash the spade ace and finesse against the queen or queen and ten. In truth, this has about a 20 percent chance of success and does not insure four tricks.

Instead South led the spade seven toward the ace. West "knew" the ace would be played and pro-duced the two. Dummy played the four and East was no doubt upset when she was unable to produce a higher card. This is the best play to guarantee four tricks.

THE SPADE ACE and subsequently the king made the contract secure, but Christel was not finished. At an appropriate time sheled toward the club queen. When East played low, the queen held.
Declarer entered dummy and again led toward her hand. East had watched partner's trump winner disappear and could now visualize a doubleton queen-jack in declarer's hand. She went up with the ace and North-South had a top score.
