

'Cinderella' filmed for Ball

Sometimes a cast of thousands doesn't mean a thing. But with Jerry Hodak, Raquel Gonzalez, Bill Kennedy, Dollie Cole, Norma Valteau and hundreds of other less-known, but equally hammy individuals, the cast of at least hundreds promises to turn in a great performance on Oct. 5 when the "Cinderella Affair" makes its world premiere at the Cinderella Ball.

The would-be stars put it all together under the direction of Michael Parrott, who used a Wayne State University film crew and the backing of producers encouraged by Tom and Diane Schoenheit.

THE CINDERELLA BALL was first staged in 1950 by the Detroit Women's Committee Tuberculosis and Health Society to raise money for the American Lung Association.

The Ball is a toast to Cinderella, a woman who suffered the agonies of, but overcame, tuberculosis.

But in 24 years the Cinderella Ball has lost some of its glitter.

And this year, with the Schoenheits heading up the event it was inevitable

that things would be different.

SO ON OCT. 5 the Cinderella Ball won't simply be dinner and dancing. Guests entering the Palm River Club will be haunted by autograph seekers. Following an elaborate session of cocktails and dinner the movie will be shown.

Throughout the making of the movie and preparations for the ball the original cause was still in sight.

Lung disease continues to kill and afflict thousands of people. And the showing of the "Cinderella Affair" will be more than a one-time performance.

THE MOVIE will be shown around the country at other fund raising

events. Parrott has also agreed to enter it in student film contests, with potential money awards promised to American Lung Association. It will also be entered in a special category of the Academy Awards.

Those who attend the ball, and view the movie will recognize immediately Jerry Hodak as Prince Charming, Raquel Gonzalez, as Cinderella, Bill Kennedy as the King and who else but Dollie Cole as the Fairy Godmother.

There are also some familiar walk-ons with Mrs. Robert Mulligan (she's also president of the Cinderella Affair), Mr. and Mrs. Robert Parrott, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Pierson, Mr. and Mrs. David Di Chiera and many more.
