Students should consider all sources

School heads meet

With inflation causing havoc in family budgets can you still afford to send your son or daughter to college? Tight money is no joke and if a student is going to raise all he needs for school les should probably consider tapping all available sources. That's the advice of the Michigan Assiçatation of Certified Public Accountants, (MACPA) whose members have been helping clients with money difficulties for years.

"A company in need of capital will explore all the possibilities," says Edwin G. Olsen, President of the Association," Lithey might issue bonds, or mortgage some of their assets, or sell assets and lease them bock. But the most likely procedure is to put together a package made up of a number of such elements.

FOR A STUDENT seeking money for tuition, fees and college living expenses, the potential sources may be different, Olsen said, but they are just as diverse, consisting of family resources, the student's own earnings, scholarships and loans.

Olsen suggests a student survey his needs, drawing up a simple statement of his filnardial condition, including savings, summer earnings, family contributions and any scholarships for which he may qualify.

Although scholarship funds have beet diminished by inflation, they are still worth pursuing, according to the MACPA.

still worth pursuing, according to the MACPA. Utilit two years ago many students in need of assistance were able to obtain federal Educational Opportunity of the Crarks of up to \$1,400 per year. This program was supplemented with another, the Basic Opportunity Grant Could be program. BOG GRANTS are based primarily on need, but scholarships based on achievement or athletic ability are still available, although in smaller quantities. Scholarships are also of-fered by states, foundations, corpo-rations, unions and professional organ-izations.

Federal assistance is available to Federal assistance is available to some veterans, to dependents of veterars who are deceased or disabled, and to dependents of persons who have retired, died or become disabled while covered by Social Security. If unsuccessful at raising enough money after these leads, a student may consider applying for a loan. In the past families would have rejected the videa of getting a loan, thinking it

was "mortgaging your future."
Today, according to the CPA's, college itself is considered an investment in the future and the loan only a means of achieving it. College "is as deserving of borrowed capital as is any other form of investment," said Olsen.
Now, he says, under a government, acquaranteed sudent loan program, accepted tuition loans made by banks and other lending institutions are insured by the federal government. They also supplement the seven per-
