Primary totals gave O'Brien 35,918 votes, despite reported campaign expenses of only \$272.

Grant finished second with 25,291 — despite campaign expenses of more than \$14,000.

The third-place candidate, who will not appear on the general election ballot received 24,465 votes although he spent almost \$9,000 trying to get on the November ballot.

O'BRIEN AND his lawyer will argue this week that the ballot designations approved by the election commission are improper. According to O'Brien, ballot designations are only authorized when two candidates opposing each other have similar names.

Candidates both level name game accusations

is — a confusion, Grant charges, that has been fostered by his opponent.

GRANT CONTENTS the only reason O'Brien finished a strong first in the August primary was that voters confused him with the better-known circuit court judge.

O'Brien denies this, insisting he was elected on his own name and qualifications.

The situation, which became a minor issue during the primary, became an issue again this week. Grant asked the county election commission to have the November ballot clearly indicate that the John O'Brien running for probate court is not the same John O'Brien who sits on the circuit court bench.

TWO OF THE three election commission members agreed that the ballot could indicate this.

After O'Brien's name, they agreed to print: "Not the present Circuit Court Judge." After Grant's name, they agreed to say: "Former Probate Court Referee, referring to Grant's former status."
