School program aids handicapped

"Most were institutionalized when they were five-years-old because there were no school programs at that time available to them. Today, however, thanks to the recently enacted Mandatory Education Act, mentally handicapped children that age attend school programs in the community."

"Speaking is Macomb-Oakland Regional Center (MORC) school worker Dick Deighton of St. Clair Shores. The institutionalized children he is referring to are no longer children—they are now teen-agers. And they are no longer living in an institution—they are now living in a group home in Royal Oak on the Detroit Baptist Children's Home complex.

"According to MORC Grant Coordinator Ben Censoni of St. Clair Shores, "Historically, it has been difficult to find community training homes for teen-agers. This has been true for so-called 'normal' children and is much more difficult for the mentally handicapped."

"In short, the reality has been that the older the mentally handicapped person, the harder it is to place him.

THE 10 YOUNG people in the group home range in age from 11 to 16 and are functioning at the severe to moderate level.

"The significant thing is," Dick Deighton said, "that although we have been opened for only five months, four of the teen-agers will soon be ready to be placed. The younger boys will be placed in community training homes, which have three or less people. The older boys will be placed in adult group homes, which is more appropriate for them since adulthood requires more of an independent life style.

"In preparation for the future placements, we have been teaching them

social, self-care and eating skills, as well as teaching them skills in semi-independent living."

Censoni added, "Originally, we thought it would be closer to a year before that many would be ready to be placed."

INITIALLY, ALL the young people attended the school program at Wing Lake Developmental Center in Bloomfield Hills. Some have gone on to the trainable program at the Oakland Training Institute.

The group home is operated by the Detroit Children's Home Board of Directors. Earl Downing, ACSW, is the executive director of the home. The recently built structure was specifically designed for group home living.

In addition to the group home, the Detroit Children's Home complex offers five far-reaching skilled services for neglected and disturbed children: Residential group living and treatment, foster family care, adoptive services, social services for unmarried parents and special education classes for resident children.

"The group home has the advantage of making use of the community resources already developed by the complex," Deighton said. "This is one of the many advantages in working with an established agency."

Many of the back-up services are provided by MORC's professional consultants.

The young people recently participated in a week long Baptist Summer Camp in Lapeer. They also have been involved in a swimming program at the South Oakland and Birmingham YMCAs. The young people also take advantage of the performing arts program at Birmingham's First Presbyterian Church.
