Annual School Meeting.

An unusually large attendance for Farmington was present when President Crosby of the school board called the meeting to order last Monday evening.

Secretary Power gave the financial report, but explained that it was incomplete as he was unable to learn what the non-resident tuition had been for the past year. Total amount received, aside from tuition, \$3444.20; balance on hand, \$395.33.

Following are some of the items in the report:

Upon motion of Governor Warner the board was instructed to purchase the Moore property adjoining that of the school if the property could be secured for a reasonable figure.

The secretary announced that the terms of John Power and Fred M. Warner were about to expire and the president appointed Floyd Nichols and Clyde Adams as tellers.

The first vote taken resulted in the election of Mr. Power to succeed himself, he having received 26 of the 35 votes cast.

The second vote resulted in the election of the governor, he receiving 31 of the 35 votes cast.

The secretary stated that the board had re-engaged Prof Goodrich at a salary of \$750 for next year, also Miss Whitbeck at \$425 and Miss Sloan at \$375. The other two positions in the school would soon be filled.

The attendance considering that of past years was quite remarkable but still no ladies graced the meeting with their presence.

Lots of Booze.

A county exchange has figured out that there were a little over 84 pints of whiskey sold by Oakland county druggists during one week of June and publishes a complete list of the sales for that week as reported by the druggists to the prosecuting attorney. The above amount is of whiskey only and does not include alcohol, wines, malt and alcoholic sundries.

Of the amount of whiskey reported, nearly 500 pints were sold in Pontiac. Rochester is second, with 135 pints, while Clarkston's thirst is represented with 54 pints. Milford is listed at about 25 pints, while South Lyon is low on the list with about 14 pints. Holly is credited with 31 pints, Birmingham 33 pints, Oxford 41 pints, Orion 21 pints, Ortonville 20 pints and Royal Oak with 18—Holly Herald.

Old Stamp.

As a matter of imperative necessity Postmaster General Hitchcock has decided to discontinue the new green special delivery stamp and return to the familiar blue stamp, showing a special delivery messenger boy mounted on a bicycle. In the great rush with which the mails must be handled many letters bearing the new stamp have escaped treatment as special delivery matter because of its similarity in size and color to the one-cent stamp. In some instances delays in delivery of such letters have caused serious loss to the public and embarrassment to the postoffice department. The issuance of the new stamp will begin at once.
