This in addition to the profit they make from the whey they receive back, makes them feel good. THE REAL OR THE SIMULATED

Popular Actor Discusses Question as to Whether Real Tears Should Be Shed on the Stage.

In T. P.'s Weekly London, appears the first article on "The Actor's Cathartic," by Robt. Lawson. To the question:

"Do real tears come into your eyes when acting a scene of pathos or tragedy, or are they merely simulated?" Some actors claim that real tears do come, but might not this lessen self-control?"

Arthur Boucher sent the following interesting reply:

"With regard to the question you raise, my humble opinion is that the actor should feel the emotions he is endeavoring to portray; but that he should always be master of those emotions if he is to create the effect aimed at upon the senses of his audience. Unless this is so, a scene of great emotion, for instance, may be, to the actor, complete abandonment, will appear to the audience the ridiculous rather than the sublime."

"The curious difference in temperament of nations was brought home to me some years ago while witnessing a very fine performance of Barrow's old play 'Forsythe' at Daly's theater in New York. In the last act the young Italian husband suddenly finds that he has been trapped into marrying a young girl of no parentage whatever—in fact, illegitimate—his rage and grief knew no bounds, yet with it all he loves the girl. The actor wept, and the audience laughed! I presume the fact of a man shedding tears was looked upon as ludicrous by the Anglo-American audience which filled the theater."

There is a kind of fondness that ruins children as surely as there is a fondness that blesses them. There is sometimes more real sweetness in a gentle repressive rebuke, than in the warmest praise; oftentimes more times in the rod than in a reward. We help our children most when we help them to take an honest view of themselves, and this we can never do by flattering their too easily flattered self-conceit.

Attorney General Bird has furnished the state tax commission with an opinion that telephone and telegraph companies may be taxed this year under the new law, and the work of ascertaining their value is already under way. 


