Operation Wildflower calls for day lilies

"Operation Wildflower" has gotten under way in Farmington with joint sponsors of the program zeroing in on the week of Oct. 1-6.

The Farmington Hills Beautification Commission in cooperation with the Hill and Dale and Farmington garden clubs has received a permit from the Department of State Highways to start planting day lilies and wild flowers as part of a national project.

The women made a call for day lilies this week from residents who would be willing to dig up a few plants, put them in a plastic bag and get the operation in its way.

A well marked area in the parking lot of the Farmington Hills City Offices, 31555 W. Eleven Mile, has been designated for receiving the plants that are donated.

Living seminar planned

The Mercy Series, "Response-Able Living," will begin Wednesday, Oct. 16, and will continue each Wednesday for five weeks in Mercy Center, Eleven Mile Road, east of Middle Belt in Farmington.

The sessions run from 8-10 p.m. and the cost is \$5 per person for the series. Pre-registration will be taken by mail, with checks made payable to Jean Feterl and sent to her at 18523 Plainview, Detroit. Registrations also will be taken on the first evening of the series.

The series is a team effort of Father Dennis Bagley, Sister Margaret Basso, Ray and Millie Geisert, Jackie Yanosy, Myrna Angelucci, Judy Kaltz, Lauretta Abel and Ms. Feterl.

JAN DOLAN, chairman of the beautification commission said Farmington was the first area in the state to receive a permit for the planting along state highways.

"We're starting with day lilies because they are a hardy sort, they don't require spraying and they will tolerate most fall conditions. None of them are in bloom now. They can be transplanted easily," she said.

The women will need literally thousands of starts of day lilies for planting at the I-696 Orchard Lake

Road interchange in Farmington Hills.

THE NEXT STEP for the joint committee of the three local organizations will be to seed the highway areas with wild flowers.

Operation Wildflower stems from the National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc.

"It is the goal of the garden clubs to have wild flowers along every main highway in the country by 1976 as their way of celebrating the bi-centennial of the United States," Mrs. Dolan said.
