SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS COUNCIL MEETING SEPTEMBER 23, 1974

A regular meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington Hills, Michigan, convened at City Hall on the 23rd day of September, 1974. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by Chairman Fred Lichtman. Present were Council members Earl Deacon, Joan Dudley, Fred Lichtman, Robert McConnell, Earl Opperbauer and Margaret Schaeffer. Councilman William Ortman was absent due to illness.

Mrs. Marlowe Bellandi and Mr. John Allen renewed the Farmington Community Arts Council's request for financial support. The feasibility of designating the FCAC as an official agency of the City continues to be explored. Copies of the first informational Newsletter to be mailed directly to homes and businesses in the City on a quarterly basis were distributed by the City Manager. Mr. Majoros reported that the Federal grant for police cadet funds, has been extended four months. The State Office of Highway Safety & Planning has also extended the term of its grant for funding traffic police services. Notice was received from the Oakland County Road Commissioners that a traffic signal at the Hagerty and 14 Mile Road intersection has been authorized. Residents of the Shiawassee and Tuck Road area petitioned the Council for assistance in controlling traffic problems on Shiawassee. The City Manager and Director of Public Services were directed to investigate the feasibility of a flashing speed limit signal for use during school hours in cooperation with the School District. A report will be submitted to the Council on October 14, 1974. The City Attorney is directed to continue negotiating for the transfer of authority for maintenance of the West Farmington and East Farmington cemeteries. An Amendment to the P. n. al Code Ordinance No. 49-C (dealing with anti-noise provisions) was adopted.

Fate, Him & Bogue Inc. was authorized to complete plans for construction of a sewer arm to service 1/2 Mile Road West of Harrison High School. Upon the request of the Franklin Homeowners Association, the Council approved the base stabilization and seal-coating improvement of Franklin Parkway by Midwest Asphalt Paving Corporation, subject to the escrow of monies by residents sufficient to cover the cost of the project.

Permit was granted to North Farmington High School for the Homecoming Parade, October 19, 1974, on 13 Mile Road. The City Clerk was directed to make application to the Oakland County Road Commission for the permit required by Harrison High School for its Homecoming Parade, Saturday, October 19, on 12 Mile Road.

Resolution No. 1, in instructing the engineers to prepare plans and cost estimates for construction of storm sewer on 13 Mile Road east of Drake Road, was approved unanimously.

Contract was awarded to Gerald J. Sukenic in the amount of \$2,450 for construction of a glass recycling center storage building on the City Hall parking lot. Chairman Lichtman requested a staff report and recommendation to be submitted October 14, 1974, concerning the adoption of the State Construction Code which will become effective November 8, 1974.

The week of October 14, 1974, was proclaimed as "Star-A-Song" week in recognition of the many programs being offered nationwide by the Sweet Adelines, the Farmington Hills Chorus, will entertain at the Detroit Baptist Manor Tuesday, October 15, 1974.

The Council expressed its appreciation for the efforts of Charles McLaughlin in planting and maintaining the handsome floral display in the City Hall courtyard. The meeting adjourned at 11:20 P.M.
